COMMUNITY PARTNERS ASSOCIATION (COPA) Chairperson's Report 2022-2023

It is with great sadness that I have to report the death of Roger Toyey, a longstanding COPA trustee and committee member, in January. Roger and Pam accompanied a work group of Gloucester Beaufort Scouts to the Dominican Republic in 1996 and they were deeply moved by the very poor conditions families were living under. Over the next 26 years, Roger contributed such a lot to the management and development of this international charity, as International Financial adviser, and as Chairperson for five years. In all his roles, with his gentle, thoughtful manner he encouraged committee members to overcome the many challenges with positivity, always steering thoughts to the long term aims and strategies. His knowledge and experience of accountancy was invaluable in setting the annual budget and scrutinising the spending in the DR each month; sponsors and trustees had that continued reassurance. COPA is indebted to his service, as he played that important part, like many others, in managing and encouraging the schools to provide quality education for thousands of Dominican and Haitian children, who now have the skills to change their own society.

This is the first year that COPA UK has taken full responsibility for supervising and funding the projects in the two schools following the withdrawal of COPA US. The budget amounting to nearly £30,000 has been spent carefully to enhance the education of our pupils in each school. The schools also receive funding from the State, but this is often intermittent, so they appreciate the generosity of COPA UK in funding those "extra" educational resources. In each reception class, COPA UK funds the employment of two teaching assistants to support the teacher in providing good early years educational practice to their large classes. The continued employment of Luciana Mendez Matos (Maribel) as Project Director has a central role in supporting quality education and administering our funding to achieve our objectives. As a former headteacher, she is respected by the community and has a strong relationship with the headteachers. Together they monitor the quality of teaching and learning. We must also pay tribute to Maribel for her enthusiasm and tenacity in developing the "pilot" pre-school project to also include La Hoya School. COPA UK have supported the project by funding the modification of the buildings at La Hoya and Bombita Schools as well as providing educational resources. The "pilot" has achieved tremendous results and become the model for other schools. The COPA Schools are highly valued by The District Education Office, who have taken videos which have been shared within the regional area. This has prompted teachers from other schools to observe the classes.

All these achievements would not have been possible without the funding from COPA UK and the diligent supervision of the COPA Committee, who give so freely of their time, experience and knowledge. La Hoya and Bombita Schools continue to flourish, fulfilling the COPA ethos of providing sound education – to change the lives and opportunities of so many children. What is more remarkable, they are having an influence on the educational provision throughout the District, Region and more widely!

COMMUNITY PARTNERS ASSOCIATION (COPA) TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees' submit their report and the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005, revised 2008).

STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Charity is an unincorporated trust, constituted under a trust deed and is a registered charity, number 1027117. The trust raises funds and recruits volunteers to operate various projects on the ground in the Barahona District of the Dominican Republic. Payments are made to cover specific cost requirements during the course of these projects which have been sanctioned at the trustees meetings.

At the trustees meetings, the trustees agree the broad strategy for the Trust including consideration of financing issues, project consideration and appraisal, and risk management policies.

The names of the Trustees in office at the end of the period are listed on page 1. All served on an honorary basis. Additional trustees are appointed by the members at a general meeting.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The trustees have considered the risks of which the charity is exposed and implemented sufficient systems of authorisation and control to mitigate those risks. As such the Trustees consider that the risks have been minimised as far as possible

OBJECTS AND ORGANISATIONAL FRAMEWORK

The Charity is established for the advancement of education, in particular through

- [i] The support and maintenance of village schools currently at La Hoya and Bombita in the district of Barahona in the Dominican Republic in such ways that are considered charitable in English law.
- [ii] For the advancement of education, in particular through the advancement of the Christian religion.
- [iii] The relief of poverty, hardship and distress, in particular without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing in the district of Barahona in the Dominican Republic.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities on Page 7. During the year income from sponsors and other donations amounted to £19,272. This was supplemented by other income, comprising Gift Aid, fundraising and interest, totalling £2,104.

Expenditure during the year was £30,394.

This gave rise to a deficit of income compared with expenditure of £9,008 for the year.

The charity continued to operate in fulfilling its objectives during the year, allocating funds received largely for defined projects to the communities of Bombita and La Hoya in the Dominican Republic.

Reserves

The Charity maintains a level of reserves to enable it to fund on-going and new projects. In addition, the Trustees retain a surplus over its normal operating requirement to help fund relief work in the event of hurricane and other emergencies. The level in the accounts of retained reserves is considered sufficient for these purposes.

Volunteers and fundraising

The Charity is ever grateful for the significant input it receives from volunteers not only at the board level but all those that give their time in fund raising, administration and also in the Dominican Republic in assisting to implement the projects on the ground. Similarly, the Charity is grateful for the financial support received from its donors and benefactors on which it relies to fund its charitable activities.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The law applicable to Charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity at the end of the financial year and of its surplus or deficit for the financial year. In doing so, the Trustees should follow best practice and:

- a) Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- b) Make sound judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- c) State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- d) Prepare financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Trust will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the trust, and which enable them to ascertain the financial position of the Trust and which enable then to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Charity (accounts and Reports) Regulations and the provision of the Trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

YEAR ENDED 31 March 2023

[1] Accounting policies

[a] Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the applicable Accounting Standards, the Charities Act 2011. In preparing the financial statements the Charity follows best practice laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2005 revised: 2008).

[b] Income and grants

Grants, voluntary income and donations are accounted for as received by the Charity unless related to a specific period. Fundraising ventures are shown gross, with the associated costs included in fundraising costs. No permanent endowments have been received in the period.

[c] Restricted funds

Funds received during the year on which there has been a restriction placed by the donor have been shown within the statement of Financial Activities under Restricted Funds. Restricted funds are all maintained within the same bank accounts and not invested in separate assets.

[d] Value added tax

The Charity is not registered for value added tax.

2. Trustees' remuneration and expenses

None of the Trustees received any remuneration during the year. However, claims for travel costs associated with the attendance at committee meetings, volunteer recruiting etc are reimbursed to the trustees. The full cost of these expense claims was £29 (2022 £Nil) have been held virtually (by Zoom). In some cases, matching donations were made by the trustees.

Trustee and officers' indemnity insurance is in place at a cost of £373 (2022 £373) for the year.
